- This will bring up the main "Public" page. This will allow you to look at the "public" calendar for your organization, event list, and handouts and other "publicly shared" files, as well as a few other options.
- The first time you go here, enter your child's ID NUMBER (provided by your Director) into the *Student Area Password* field. You will be directed to the Change Password screen, to set a personal password different from the ID, for future use. GRADES

Playing Tests = 100 Points
Daily Rehearsal Grades = 100 Points per Week
(On Time, Prepared, Performing)
Performances = 250 Points
Dress rehearsals, worksheets, homework and written assignments as assigned

During concert preparation, students will be tested based on the available time and material that has been covered. All tests and playing exams will be given over sections of music or skills that the students have covered in class and should know.

Absences must be reported to the director prior to the event. Conflicts with other school activities must be worked out by the student between the coach and director. Excused absences such as extreme illness or family death can be made up for full credit, all unexcused absences can be made up for half credit.

Every student is responsible for his or her own grade and is expected to monitor it regularly. Parents will receive regular emails through the district Skyward System. Parents are encouraged to contact their Mrs. Pfeiffer should questions arise regarding grades.

PRACTICING

Proper methods of practice and the amount of time spent will be discussed with the students and will be reviewed as the year progresses. While no official practice records will be collected, emphasis will be placed on individual skill performance. Playing tests will be done on a regular basis. Students will have two weeks in which to improve their test scores as they feel necessary.

ELIGIBILITY

Eligibility is monitored by the middle school activities director as mandated by the Kansas State High School Activities Association. Students who are failing two or more classes at the end of each nine weeks is declared ineligible until the next quarter. While ineligible students may still attend concerts and other school sponsored activities, they may not participate in any Pioneer League events.

MUSIC CHECKOUT

All students will be issued music to keep in their 1" 3-Ring Binder. If they do not receive a particular piece of music, it is their responsibility to ask the director for a copy. The students will be held accountable for their own music and music binder. Limited replacement copies will be available if circumstances warrant a replacement as long as it does not become a habit.

EXPECTATIONS

At Rehearsal:

Be in your chair with stand, instrument, music, and pencil and ready to rehearse 3 minutes after the bell rings. This will allow you ample time to be ready to go.

Check the board for announcements, rehearsal schedule, etc.

Begin each class period by assembling your instrument and placing your pencil and binder on the stand. Do not play until asked to do so.

Come to rehearsals prepared. This will maximize our use of time so that we may work on the music as a full ensemble.

If you have problems with a part, ask for help so we can get the problems solved. You should first ask your section leader, and then your instructor.

Classroom Expectations:

Follow the social contract agreed upon and signed by all group members. Respect yourself and others. Keep your hands, feet, instruments, cases and classroom supplies in your own personal space.

Be responsible for yourself.

Follow directions

Keep track of all music, handouts, etc.

Put all supplies, chairs and stands away at the end of each class period Keep lockers locked at all times

Be on time to rehearsals and performances

Use a positive, indoor tone when speaking

Listen to others

Participate in classroom discussions, rehearsals and performances Turn in any money to the blue lock box.

Consequences for not adhering to the expectations:

Verbal warning (Points taken off of daily grade)

Conference with the student

Parent Contact

Office referral

* In the event that a student blatantly and/or maliciously causes a classroom disruption, the student will immediately be dismissed to the main office for a conference with an administrator.*

INSTRUMENT LOCKERS

All lockers in the instrumental room must be secured with a school issued padlock, no personal locks allowed. Any student, issued a lock and loses it, will be responsible for paying \$7 to replace it. All students are responsible for making sure their lockers are secured each day as we are not responsible for lost/stolen items. Students may bring their instruments to their locker each morning after the 7:30 dismissal bell. I encourage all students to take their instruments home to practice each night. However, we understand that there will be nights when the students have other commitments and will not be able to practice. All students must bring their instrument home on weekends and over school holidays. Students should have their names on everything that belongs to them including music, folders, cases, books, and any other supplies that could be misplaced. The schools and directors are not responsible for lost or stolen items.

REOUIRED SUPPLIES

- ♦ BOOKS Purchased by each student
 - 7th Grade-String Basics 2 & 3 8th Grade-String Basics Book 3 and A Scale in Time
- ♦ 1" 3-Ring Binder with Name Labeled
- ♦ Lock on Locker
- ♦ All students must have a pencil for every rehearsal
- ♦ It would be ideal if each student could practice at home with a metronome and tuner, there are many inexpensive, easily portable models from which to choose as well as apps for devices
- ♦ All Students must have a folding music stand at home for practicing
- ♦ All violins and violas must have an extra set of strings and a shoulder rest in their case at all times. If you pop a string and cannot replace it because you do not have the equipment, you will lose participation points
- All cellos and basses need a rock stop, and their own rosin labeled with their name on it
- Many local music stores will deliver supplies as well as pick-up/drop-off instruments in need of repairs. Parents are responsible for all communication with the music stores.

CONCERT ATTIRE

Boys: White long-sleeve, button up shirt, black dress pants (no jeans), black socks, black dress shoes (no sandals or tennis shoes)

<u>Girls:</u> White blouse (appropriate under-garments-white cami, tank top or undershirt), black dress pants (no skirts, capris or jeans)

DISTRICT STRINGS CHAIR PLACEMENT POLICY

The Goddard String Orchestras are learning environments created to allow all students to enjoy practicing and performing high levels of literature and to promote growth within the musical setting. The directors believe in a chair rotation system that fosters leadership, relationships, and community responsibility rather than a ranking system of chairs from front to back. Directors will assess playing tests from time to time and provide players with individual feedback on their personal performance. However, the rotation seating will be done to allow players to experience different chair placements front to back, work with different stand partners as well as rotate violin parts. In addition, directors will assign a seating for each concert and festival performance that allows for the most balanced sound of the orchestra on each selection. As with any other academic class, it will remain up to the teacher's discretion to place students in the most efficient seating chart for learning and performing.

Students who wish to challenge themselves in a more competitive environment are strongly encouraged to take private lessons and audition for groups such as the Youth Symphony, Pioneer Honor Orchestras, District and State Orchestras and participate in Solo and Ensemble Festivals.
